A Letter from Two of Our Founders

Dear Community,

Our work together started in 2016 when we began responding to the needs of Syrian families who were resettling in San Diego and struggling to navigate life beyond their homelands. We supported with housing, hosted activities in the park, and tutored students in the library. In 2018, we finally opened the doors to our own space: Majdal, the Arab Community Center of San Diego.

Inspired by the work of Palestinian youth organizer Khaled Bakrawi, we recognize that Arab communities here in San Diego are linked by experiences of **war, occupation, and refugeehood.** This is why our means of building resilience and community power beyond our homelands are necessarily connected.

This past year, we witnessed our work of the past four years result in incredible growth. From the opening of our doors in 2018 to the hiring of our first staff members in 2020, our vision of a **local resource and community space** for all of San Diego's Arab residents, refugees, and immigrants is finally coming to fruition.

We welcomed a part-time community health worker, Aeshaa Salman, to lead education, awareness, and response efforts to the pandemic.

We formalized a Steering Committee and Board of Directors, tasked with implementing the vision and strategy of the Center.

2020 Census Campaigning

We were one of the leading local organizations campaigning to get our Arab communities in San Diego registered for the 2020 Census.

We supported **300 families** register for the census through phone banking, canvassing, social media campaigning, and workshops.

Since the Census helps to determine the allocation of public funds and political representation and gives us information about our communities' needs, the stakes were high for our Arab communities, many of whom are recent refugees or immigrants and were not included in the last census conducted 10 years ago.

The COVID-19 pandemic worsened existing community needs for housing access, food and supplies, and employment. In response, we expanded our public health work and helped community members access rental assistance and essential goods.

Our Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic We partnered with the County of San Diego Health & Human Services Agency.

We developed educational resources and hosted workshops in order to raise awareness about COVID-19 prevention and testing.

We interviewed 21 families about the impact of COVID-19 on their wellbeing, socioeconomic status, and education, which contributed to a report by the San Diego Refugee Communities Coalition.

We (Re) Launched our Tutoring and Volunteer Programs!

We recruited over 20 students and volunteers in 2020! Youth education and leadership is at the heart of our work. Since our beginnings, we have hosted after-school tutoring programs and activities to offer youth resources and a sense of belonging.

In the fall of 2020, we relaunched this work with an online tutoring program where we pair students with volunteer tutors for weekly one-on-one sessions.

Our tutoring program supports refugee and immigrant students with overcoming the challenges of language barriers, new school settings, and remote learning.
